Topographies of Japanese Modernism Seiji M. Lippit, 2002 What happens when a critique of modernity a revolt against the traditions of the Western world is situated within a non European context where the concept of the modern has been inevitably tied to the image of the West Seiji M Lippit offers the first comprehensive study in English of Japanese modernist fiction of the 1920s and 1930s Through close readings of four leading figures of this movement Akutagawa Yokomitsu Kawabata and Hayashi Lippit aims to establish a theoretical and historical framework for the analysis of Japanese modernism The 1920s and 1930s witnessed a general sense of crisis surrounding the institution of literature marked by both the radical politicization of literary practice and the explosion of new forms of cultural production represented by mass culture Against this backdrop this study traces the heterogeneous literary topographies of modernist writings Through an engagement with questions of representation subjectivity and ideology it situates the disintegration of literary form in these texts within the writers exploration of the fluid borderlines of Japanese modernity

Mitchell, 2020-10-15 *Disruptions of Daily Life* explores the mass media landscape of early twentieth century in order to uncover the subversive societal impact of four major Japanese authors Tanizaki Jun ichir Yokomitsu Riichi Kawabata Yasunari and Hirabayashi Taiko Arthur Mitchell examines this literature against global realities through a modernist lens studying an alternative modernism that challenges the Western European model Through broad surveys of discussions surrounding Japanese life in the 1920s Mitchell locates and examines flourishing divergent ideologies of the early twentieth century such as gender ethnicity and nationalism He unravels how the narrative and linguistic strategies of modernist texts interrogated the innocence of this language disrupting their hold on people's imagined relationship to daily life These modernist works often discursively displaced the authority of their own claims by inadvertently exposing the global epistemology of East vs

West Mitchell's reading of these formalist texts expands modernism studies into a more translational dialogue by locating subversions within the local historical culture and allowing readers to make connections to the time and place in which the texts were written. In highlighting the unbreakable link between literature and society, *Disruptions of Daily Life* reaffirms the value of modernist fiction and its ability to make us aware of how realities are constructed and how those realities can be changed.

Gardner, 2020-05-11 On a December morning in 1925, a newspaper journalist reported receiving 25 different handbills in an hour's walk in downtown Tokyo, advertising everything from Western style clothing and furniture to sweet shops, charity organizations, phonograph recordings, plays, and films. The activities of advertisers and the new entertainment culture and patterns of consumption that they promoted helped to define a new urban aesthetic emerging in the 1920s. This book examines some of the responses of Japanese authors to the transformation of Tokyo in the early decades of the twentieth century. In particular, it explores the themes and formal strategies of the modernist literature that flourished in the 1920s, focusing on the work of Hagiwara Kyōji (1899-1938) and Hayashi Fumiko (1903-1951). William Gardner shows how modernist works offer new constructions of individual subjectivity amid the social and technological changes that provided the ground for the appearance of mass media. Hagiwara's conception of the poem and poet as an electric radio advertising tower provides an emblem for the aesthetic tensions and multiple discourses of technology, media, urbanism, commerce, and propaganda that were circulating through the urban environment at the time. While Hayashi's work, with its references to popular songs, plays, and movies, suggests an understanding of everyday life as the interface between individual subjectivity and a highly mediated environment.

Beauty Matters Anri Yasuda, 2024-06-04 The notion of beauty is inherently elusive; aesthetic judgments are at once subjective and felt to be universally valid. In *Beauty Matters*, Anri Yasuda demonstrates that by exploring the often conflicting yet powerful pull of aesthetic sentiments, major authors of the late Meiji (1868-1912) and Taishō (1912-1926) periods illuminated themes and perspectives that resonated broadly in modern Japanese society. This approach presents an alternative to conventional accounts in which Japanese literature before the modernist turn of the 1920s has tended to be defined by an insular focus on subjective representation and autobiographical realism. Yasuda investigates how Natsume Sōseki, Mori Ōgai, Mushanokōji Saneatsu, and his peers at *Shirakaba* magazine, and Akutagawa Ryūnosuke sought to identify the aesthetic properties of literature through comparisons with the visual arts. They also considered the position of Japanese cultural sensibilities within the Eurocentric imperial world order. Their stories featuring painters and paintings weigh the fundamental challenge of representing anything when the conditions of knowledge are in flux, and their stories about cross-cultural encounters display

both hope and ambivalence about the prospect of cosmopolitanism Yasuda shows how thinking about beauty and art enabled these authors to surpass purely literary concerns By tracing the wide reaching significance of aesthetic affect in literary thought *Beauty Matters* destabilizes received conceptions of literature's parameters and affirms literature's continued potential to intervene in cultural discourses in Japan and beyond

The Youth of Things Stephen Dodd, 2014-01-31 When he died from tuberculosis at the age of thirty one Kajii Motojir had written only twenty short stories Yet his life and work it is argued here sheds light on a significant moment in Japanese history and ultimately adds to our understanding of how modern Japanese identity developed By the time Kajii began to write in the mid 1920s there was heated debate among his peers over legitimate forms of literary expression Japanese Romantics questioned the value of a western inspired version of modernity others were influenced by Marxist proletarian literature or modernist experimentation still others tried to create a distinctly Japanese fictional style that concentrated on first person perspective the so called I novel There was a general sense that Japan needed to reinvent itself but writers and artists were at odds over what form this reinvention should take Throughout his career Kajii drew from these various camps but belonged to none of them making his work an invaluable indicator of a culture in crisis and transition *The Youth of Things* is the first full length book devoted to Kajii Motojir It brings together English translations of nearly all his completed stories with an analysis of his literature in the context of several major themes that locate him in 1920s Japan In particular Dodd links the writer's work with the physical body Kajii's subjective literary presence was grounded first and foremost in his TB stricken physical body hence one cannot be studied without the other His concerns with health and mortality drove him to play a central role in constructing a language for modern literature and to offer new insights into ideas that intrigued so many other Taisho intellectuals and writers In addition Kajii's early years as a writer were strongly influenced by the cosmopolitan humanism of the White Birch Shirakaba school but by the time his final work was published in the early 1930s an environment of greater cultural introspection was beginning to take root encapsulated in the expression return to Japan *nihon kaiki* Only a few years separate these two moments in time but they represent a profound shift in the aspirations and expectations of a whole generation of writers Through a study of Kajii's writing this book offers some sense of the demise of one cultural moment and the creation of another

Modernism Between Benjamin and Goethe Matthew Charles, 2019-12-12 Widely regarded as one of the foremost cultural critics of the last century Walter Benjamin's relation to Modernism has largely been understood in the context of his reception of the aesthetic theories of Early German Romanticism and his associated interest in avant garde Surrealism But this Romantic understanding only gives half the picture Running through Benjamin's thought is also a critique of Romanticism developed in conjunction with a positive engagement with the philosophical artistic and historical writings of J W von Goethe In demonstrating the significance of these Goethean elements this book challenges the dominant understanding of Benjamin's philosophy as essentially Romantic and instead proposes that Goethe's Classicism conceived as the counterpoint to Romanticism permits a corrective to the latter's deficiencies Benjamin's Modernist concept of criticism it is argued is constituted in the movement
