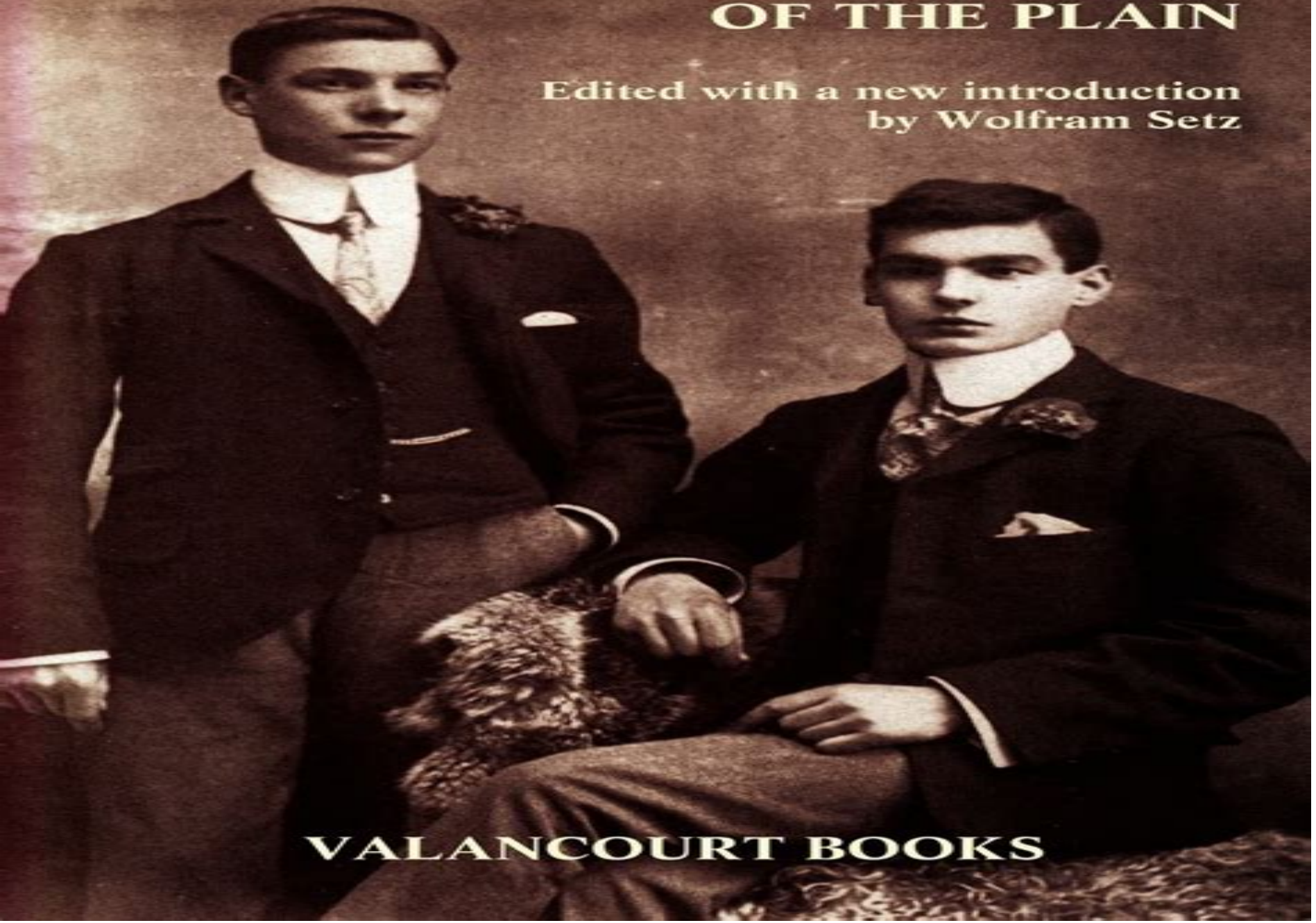

The Sins of the Cities of the Plain Bram Stoker, Jack Saul, Wolfram Setz, 2012-08-01 Jack Saul is a handsome young man in London who has found his body to be his best asset and makes his way through life as a prostitute One day Jack is picked up by a male customer in Leicester Square and after their encounter the man offers to pay Jack for a written account of his experiences What follows is *The Sins of the Cities of the Plain* a narrative tracing in explicit detail the development of Jack's vices as he progresses from boarding school and into young adulthood amidst London's thriving but clandestine gay underworld Featuring a mixture of fact and fiction and incorporating real life personages involved in the Cleveland Street Scandal the Oscar Wilde trials and other infamous legal proceedings of the period *The Sins of the Cities of the Plain* was one of the first and frankest works on homosexuality in Victorian England Read by Oscar Wilde and an influence on the more famous gay erotic novel *Teleny* 1893 *The Sins of the Cities of the Plain* was privately printed in two volumes in 1881 and is completely unobtainable today This new edition contains the unabridged text of the first edition housed at the British Library together with a new introduction by Wolfram Setz and a facsimile reproduction of the original volumes title pages Although two previous modern editions have been published under this title they are severely altered and rewritten versions of the story this edition marks the first complete reprinting of the original text *Classics in Extremis* Edmund

Many Victorian writers believed so In the mid nineteenth century acoustical scientists such as Hermann von Helmholtz and John Tyndall described music as a set of physical vibrations that tickled the ear excited the nerves and precipitated muscular convulsions In turn writers from canonical figures such as George Eliot and Thomas Hardy to New Women novelists like Sarah Grand and Bertha Thomas to anonymous authors of underground pornography depicted bodily sensations and experiences in unusually explicit ways These writers used scenes of music listening and performance to intervene in urgent conversations about gender and sexuality and explore issues of agency pleasure violence desire and kinship *Sounding Bodies*

shows how both classical music and Victorian literature while often considered bastions of conservatism and repression represented powerful sites for feminist and queer politics

The Waltzing Body in Victorian Literature Sabrina Gilchrist Hadyk, 2025-03-27 The Waltzing Body in Victorian Literature Narratives of Sexuality and Power traces the evolution of the waltz from a taboo dance in the early nineteenth century to a gracefully nostalgic practice that must be preserved by the century's end While Sabrina Gilchrist Hadyk references eighteenth century authors to frame the waltz's initial reception in England the study focuses primarily on Victorian authors who shaped how and why this dance was paradoxically viewed as elegant effeminate and sterile Hadyk explores female sexuality and the concept of choice in the ballroom a shifting and sometimes contradictory understanding of masculinity through male performance the erasure of and reclamation of queer desire in heterosexual courting spaces and the rhetoric of new technologies that attempted to contain shape and memorialize a temporal art form A brief epilogue considers how late Victorian and heavily sanitized and romanticized depictions of the waltz reverberate today in popular films and reality TV which perpetuate Victorian assumptions about class gender sexuality and more By understanding the history of the waltz the reader is invited to examine the dizzying discomfort that many Victorians expressed about forging ahead into a modern and modernizing world particularly at the turn of the century With comparatively little scholarship around understanding dance scenes and dance semiotics in literature this book articulates a new interpretive path for familiar and unfamiliar nineteenth
