Emma Crawford, 2019 Cultural communication practices are defined as the communicative and social behaviors that develop within a community over time The communication of emotions is a particularly culturally sensitive practice because emotional expression can reflect the values of the individual family as well as the social rules within their culture Although it is widely known that Native American culture and more specifically Anishinaabe culture differ from mainstream American culture there are few studies currently demonstrating the implications and relevance of this difference in the context of speech and language therapy Ten Anishinaabe families and ten Mainstream American families were interviewed with the Early Development of Emotional Competence EDEC tool a semi structured caregiver interview form that was previously developed by Na Wilkinson and Liang 2016 The tool includes open ended and closed ended questions related to personality communication and emotional expression The results from mixed method analysis revealed the following differences 1 Anishinaabe caregivers reported more members of family and community networks who were involved with the child's development than Mainstream American caregivers 2 more Anishinaabe caregivers reported their child to be shy or hesitant with new or unfamiliar people than Mainstream American caregivers 3 although more Anishinaabe caregivers than Mainstream American caregivers reported instances of empathy from their child Anishinaabe caregivers reported less instances of joining in or interacting with individuals who were expressing strong emotion than Mainstream American caregivers 4 Anishinaabe caregivers reported responding to their child's negative emotions through acknowledgement discussion or problem solving more often than Mainstream American caregivers and 5 Anishinaabe caregivers reported preparing their child for new or unfamiliar situations more often than Mainstream American caregivers Implications for future research and clinical applications are discussed **Development and Evaluation of an Emotional Competence**
