González,2020-08-31 In this book Octavio R González revisits the theme of alienation in the twentieth century novel identifying an alternative aesthetic centered on the experience of double exile or marginalization from both majority and home culture This misfit modernist aesthetic decenters the mainstream narrative of modernism which explores alienation from a universal and existential perspective by showing how a group of authors leveraged modernist narrative to explore minoritarian experiences of cultural nonbelonging Tying the biography of a particular author to a close reading of one of that author's major works González considers in turn Nella Larsen's *Quicksand* Wallace Thurman's *The Blacker the Berry* Jean Rhys's *Quartet* and Christopher Isherwood's *A Single Man* Each of these novels explores conditions of maladjustment within one of three burgeoning cultural movements that sought representation in the greater public sphere the New Negro movement during the Harlem Renaissance the 1920s Paris expatriate scene and the queer expatriate scene in Los Angeles before Stonewall Using a methodological approach that resists institutional taxonomies of knowledge González shows that this double exile speaks profoundly through largely autobiographical narratives and that the novels' protagonists challenge the compromises made by these minoritarian groups out of an urge to assimilate into dominant social norms and values Original and innovative Misfit Modernism is a vital contribution to conversations about modernism in the contexts of sexual identity nationality and race Moving beyond the debates over the intellectual legacies of intersectionality and queer theory González shows us new ways to think about exclusion

Léonce Rosenberg's Cubism Giovanni Casini,2023-08-31 The history of modernism has generally been written as a story of artists and their creations alongside the collectors gallerists and curators who supported them This is especially true of Cubism where the received narrative centers on a tightly circumscribed group of artists and agents connected to the dealer Daniel Henry Kahnweiler Léonce Rosenberg's Cubism shakes up the canon revealing its artificial nature and pointing to a different more inclusive understanding of the development of Cubism Kahnweiler's Cubism was narrowly focused In contrast Giovanni Casini shows us the influential art dealer Léonce Rosenberg bought virtually any piece that could be labeled Cubist and proposed a radically different understanding of the movement At Rosenberg's Galerie L'Effort Moderne in Paris artists such as Joseph Csaky Auguste Herbin Jean Metzinger Diego Rivera Gino Severini and Georges Valmier were accorded the same treatment as Pablo Picasso or Georges Braque In this book Casini considers Rosenberg's contribution to the history of Cubism reflecting on the ways in which artistic movements are manufactured and interpretive paradigms adopted Deftly weaving biography with a scholarly analysis built on extensive archival research Léonce Rosenberg's Cubism is a fresh look at the history of interwar modernism

and the definitive study of a figure who has been unjustly sidelined in the history of art It will be compulsory reading for scholars of Cubism and Modernism [Cold War in the White Cube](#) Delia Solomons,2023-04-28 In 1959 the very year the Cuban Revolution amplified Cold War tensions in the Americas museumgoers in the United States witnessed a sudden surge in major exhibitions of Latin American art Surveying the 1960s boom of such exhibits this book documents how art produced in regions considered susceptible to communist influence was staged on U S soil for U S audiences Held in high profile venues such as the Guggenheim Museum the Walker Art Center MoMA and the Art Institute of Chicago the exhibitions of the 1960s Latin American art boom did not define a single stylistic trend or the art of a single nation but rather attempted to frame Latin America as a unified whole for U S audiences Delia Solomons calls attention to disruptive artworks that rebelled against the curatorial frames purporting to hold them and reveals these exhibitions to be complex contact zones in which competing voices collided Ultimately through multiple means including choosing to exclude artworks with readily decipherable political messages and evading references to contemporary inter American frictions the U S curators who organized these shows crafted projections of Pan American partnership and harmony with the United States as leader interpreter and good neighbor during an era of brutal U S interference across the Americas Theoretically sophisticated and highly original this survey of Cold War era Latin American art exhibits sheds light on the midcentury history of major U S art museums and makes an important contribution to the fields of museum studies art history and Latin American modernist art

Nature's Experiments and the Search for Symbolist Form Allison Morehead,2017-02-27 This provocative study argues that some of the most inventive artwork of the 1890s was strongly influenced by the methods of experimental science and ultimately foreshadowed twentieth century modernist practices Looking at avant garde figures such as Maurice Denis douard Vuillard August Strindberg and Edvard Munch Allison Morehead considers the conjunction of art making and experimentalism to illuminate how artists echoed the spirit of an increasingly explorative scientific culture in their work and processes She shows how the concept of nature s experiments the belief that the study of pathologies led to an understanding of scientific truths above all about the human mind and body extended from the scientific realm into the world of art underpinned artists solutions to the problem of symbolist form and provided a ready made methodology for fin de si cle truth seekers By using experimental methods to transform symbolist theories into visual form these artists broke from naturalist modes and interrogated concepts such as deformation automatism the arabesque and madness to create modern works that were radically and usefully strange Focusing on the scientific psychological and experimental tactics of symbolism Nature s Experiments and the Search for Symbolist Form demystifies the avant garde value of experimentation and reveals new and important insights into a foundational period for the development of European modernism [**Qayrawān**](#) William Gallois,2024-01-23 In the last years of the nineteenth century the Tunisian city of Qayrawān suddenly found itself covered in murals Concentrated on and around the city s Great Mosque these monumental artworks were only visible for about fifty

years from the 1880s through the 1930s. This book investigates the fascinating history of who created these outdoor paintings and why. Using visual archaeological methods, William Gallois reconstructs the visual history of these works and vividly brings them back to life. He locates pictorial records of the murals from the backdrops of photographs, postcards and other forms of European ephemera. In Qayrawān, he identifies a form of religious painting that transposed traditional aesthetic forms such as house decoration, embroidery and tattooing, which lay exclusively within the domains of women onto the body of a conquered city. Gallois argues that these works were created by women as a form of emergency art intended to offer amuletic protection for the community and demonstrates how they differ markedly from classical Islamic antecedents and modern modes of Arab cultural production in the Middle East and North Africa. Based on extensive archival research, this study is both a record of a unique moment in the history of art and a challenge to rethink the spiritual force and agency of a group of anonymous female artists whose paintings aspired to help save the world at a time of great peril. It will be welcomed by scholars of art history, Islamic studies, Middle East studies and the history of magic.

The Avant-Garde and the Margin Sanja Bahun-Radunovic, V.G. Julie Rajan, 2009-03-26 The collection of essays *The Avant-garde and the Margin: New Territories of the Modernist Avant-garde* refigures the critical and historical picture of the modernist avant garde by introducing a variety of less commonly discussed geo-artistic sites and dynamics. The contributors explore the multifaceted relations established between the avant-garde centers France, Germany, England and others and their counterparts in the cultural periphery: Greece, India, Japan, Poland, Quebec, Romania and the former Yugoslavia, as well as the unique artistic and literary dialogues which these encounters engendered.
