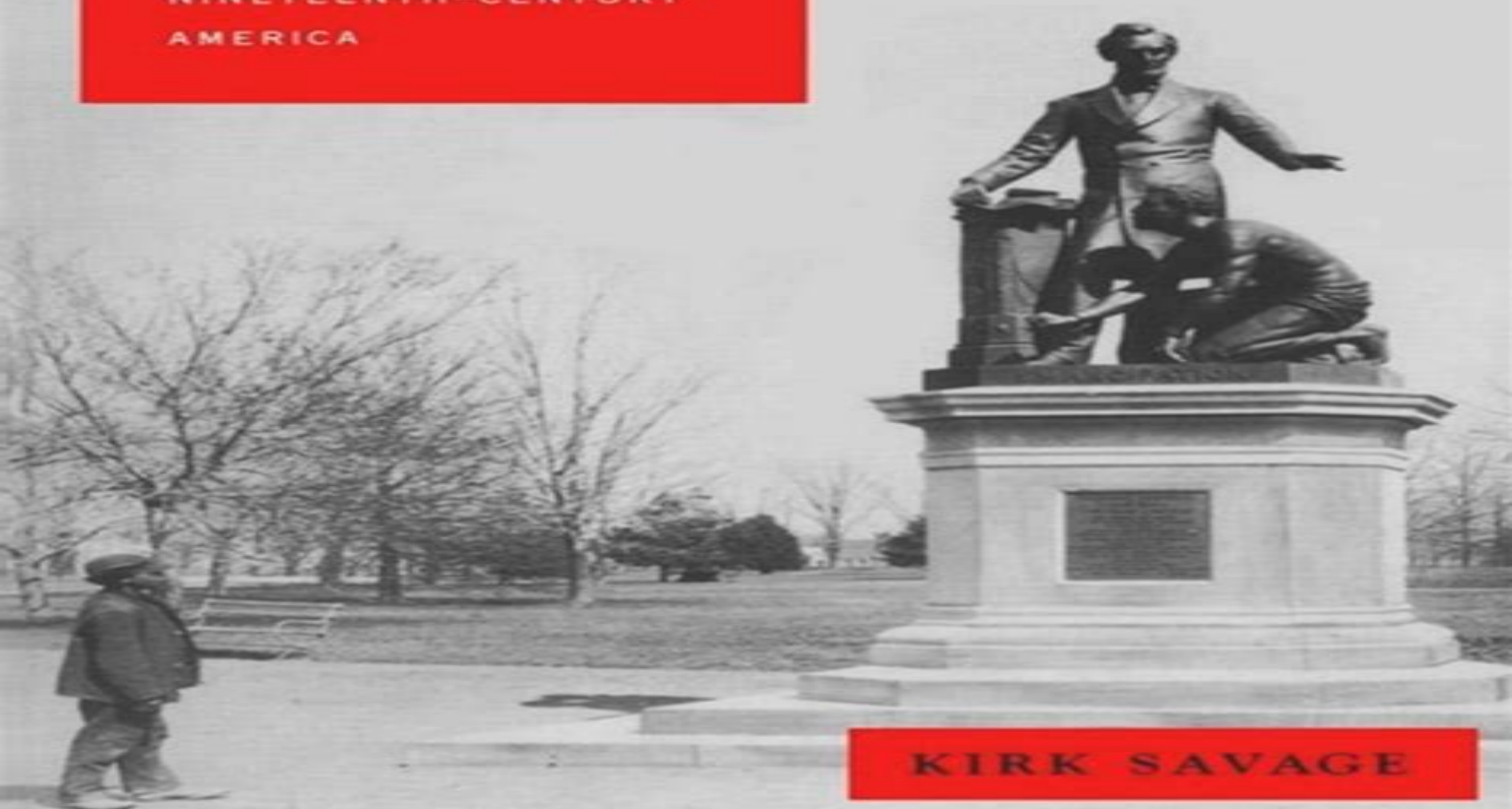

Standing Soldiers, Kneeling Slaves Kirk Savage, 2018-07-31 A history of U S Civil War monuments that shows how they distort history and perpetuate white supremacy The United States began as a slave society holding millions of Africans and their descendants in bondage and remained so until a civil war took the lives of a half million soldiers some once slaves themselves Standing Soldiers Kneeling Slaves explores how the history of slavery and its violent end was told in public spaces specifically in the sculptural monuments that came to dominate streets parks and town squares in nineteenth century America Looking at monuments built and unbuilt Kirk Savage shows how the greatest era of monument building in American history took place amid struggles over race gender and collective memory Standing Soldiers Kneeling Slaves probes a host of fascinating questions and remains the only sustained investigation of post Civil War monument building as a process of national and racial definition Featuring a new preface by the author that reflects on recent events surrounding the meaning of these monuments and new photography and illustrations throughout this new and expanded edition reveals how monuments exposed the myth of a united people and have only become more controversial with the passage of time

Surviving Wounded Knee David W. Grua, 2015-12-21 On December 29 1890 the U S Seventh Cavalry killed more than two hundred Lakota Ghost Dancers including men women and children at Wounded Knee Creek South Dakota After the work of death ceased at Wounded Knee the work of memory commenced For the US Army and some whites Wounded Knee was the site where a heroic victory was achieved against the fanatical Chief Big Foot and his treacherous Ghost Dancers and where the struggle between civilization and savagery for North America came to an end For other whites it was a stain on the national

conscience a leading example of America's dishonorable dealings with Native peoples For Lakota survivors it was the site of a horrific massacre of a peacemaking chief and his people and where the United States violated its treaty promises and slaughtered innocents Historian David Grua argues that Wounded Knee serves as a window into larger debates over how the United States conquest of the indigenous peoples should be remembered During the five decades after Wounded Knee the survivors pursued historical justice in the form of compensation in accordance with traditional Lakota conflict resolution practices and treaty provisions that required compensation for past wrongs The survivors engaged in the politics of memory by preparing compensation claims erecting a monument in memory of the Chief Big Foot massacre at the mass grave on the Pine Ridge Reservation by dictating accounts to sympathetic whites and by testifying before the U S Congress in the 1930s in support of a bill intended to liquidate the liability of the United States for Wounded Knee Despite the bill's failure the survivors prolonged pursuit of justice laid the foundation for later activists who would draw upon the memorial significance of Wounded Knee to promote indigenous sovereignty Published on the 125th anniversary of this controversial event *Surviving Wounded Knee* examines the Lakota survivors half century pursuit of justice and points to lingering questions about the United States willingness to address the liabilities of Indian conquest

Emancipation Maggie Adler, Maurita Poole, 2023-03-14 *Emancipation* critically interrogates the impact of sculpture in public life centering around ideas of agency and emancipation in historical and contemporary expression The fulcrum of the book will be the Amon Carter Museum of American Art's copy of John Quincy Adams Ward's bronze sculpture *The Freedman* 1863 Unlike conventional depictions of enslaved African Americans at this time which showed them as powerless this heroic figure has broken his chains The catalogue begins with an introduction to Civil War era works contextualizing *The Freedman* then examines the work of six contemporary Black artists whose respective practices engage the mediums of sculpture and installation connected to themes of freedom or imprisonment the long legacy of the Civil War in the United States body and personhood Featuring the work of Sadie Barnette Maya Freelon Hugh Hayden Letitia Huckaby Jeffrey Meris and Sable Elyse Smith as well as a reprinted short story by N K Jemisin *Emancipation* brings contemporary issues of racial inequities the legacy of war and conflict and issues of freedom or lack thereof for Black Americans to the fore

A Sisterhood of Sculptors Melissa Dabakis, 2014-06-30 This project is made possible through support from the Terra Foundation for American Art When Elizabeth Cady Stanton penned the Declaration of Sentiments for the first women's rights convention held in Seneca Falls New York in 1848 she unleashed a powerful force in American society In *A Sisterhood of Sculptors* Melissa Dabakis outlines the conditions under which a group of American women artists adopted this egalitarian view of society and negotiated the gendered terrain of artistic production at home and abroad Between 1850 and 1876 a community of talented women sought creative refuge in Rome and developed successful professional careers as sculptors Some of these women have become well known in art historical circles Harriet Hosmer Edmonia Lewis Anne Whitney and Vinnie Ream The reputations of others have

remained until now buried in the historical record Emma Stebbins Margaret Foley Sarah Fisher Ames and Louisa Lander At midcentury they were among the first women artists to attain professional stature in the American art world while achieving international fame in Rome London and other cosmopolitan European cities In their invention of modern womanhood they served as models for a younger generation of women who adopted artistic careers in unprecedented numbers in the years following the Civil War At its core *A Sisterhood of Sculptors* is concerned with the gendered nature of creativity and expatriation Taking guidance from feminist theory cultural geography and expatriate and postcolonial studies Dabakis provides a detailed investigation of the historical phenomenon of women s artistic lives in Rome in the mid nineteenth century As an interdisciplinary examination of femininity and creativity it provides models for viewing and interpreting nineteenth century sculpture and for analyzing the gendered status of the artistic profession *After the Glory* Donald Robert Shaffer,2004 Shaffer chronicles the postwar transition of black veterans from the Union army as well as their subsequent life patterns political involvement family and marital life experiences with social welfare comradeship with other veterans and memories of the war itself He draws on such sources as Civil War pension records to fashion a collective biography a social history of both ordinary and notable lives resurrecting the words and memories of many black veterans to provide an intimate view of their lives and struggles BOOK JACKET **RACAR, Revue D'art Canadienne** ,2003

Neff,2005 In his estimation Northerners were just as active as Southerners in myth making after the war Crafting a Cause Victorious myth that was every bit as resonant and powerful as the much better known Lost Cause myth cherished by Southerners the North asserted through commemorations the existence of a loyal and reunified nation long before it was actually a fact Neff reveals that as Northerners and Southerners honored their separate dead they did so in ways that underscore the limits of reconciliation between Union and Confederate veterans whose mutual animosities lingered for many decades after the end of the war Ultimately Neff argues that the process of reunion and reconciliation that has been so much the focus of recent literature either neglects or dismisses the persistent reluctance of both Northerners and Southerners to forgive and forget especially where their dead were concerned **Washington History** ,2001 Ski Style Annie Gilbert Coleman,2004 Coleman traces skiing from its Norse roots and Alpine influences through the utility of ski travel in the winter Rockies to the rise of Colorado resorts Much more than a history of the sport her work explains how the recreation industry sold the experience of skiing and created mythic mountain landscapes with real problems and a ski culture that exalts celebrity and status over the physical act of skiing Jacket Presidential Temples Benjamin Hufbauer,2005 This book explores the visual and material cultures of presidential commemoration memorials and monuments libraries and archives and the problematic ways in which presidents themselves have largely taken over their own commemoration The author sees these various commemorative sites as playing a key role in the construction of our collective political and cultural self images and as another sign of our preoccupation with celebrity culture Ultimately he
