

TEAM WORK

OBJECTIVES:

1. To help them develop the skill of working in a group setting.
2. To help them develop confidence of sharing ideas and opinions in group setting.
3. To help them develop trust for team members.

LESSON PLAN:

We will start this lesson with an activity. Divide your class in two or more groups, maximum have 4-5 students in each group. Tell them, that for this game/activity you all need to trust your group members. We are going to play Human Knot! Yes, you heard it right. Here are the steps to follow:

- (i) Ask each group to hold hands and form a circle. Remember where each member is standing, it is their original position.
- (ii) Each member of the group has to cross their arms, and hold each other (refer to image 2).
- (iii) Now, they have to return to their original position without letting go of each other's hand!



You can either do this with a time limit or at end if no group is able to solve, you help them or just terminate it there followed by discussion.

Discussion is the main part of the activity. Ask them questions like:

- What do you think was the point of this activity?
- According to you what you would have done differently that could help in solving the knot?
- What role did the your team mates play?

Similarly add leading questions based on how your activity ends.
