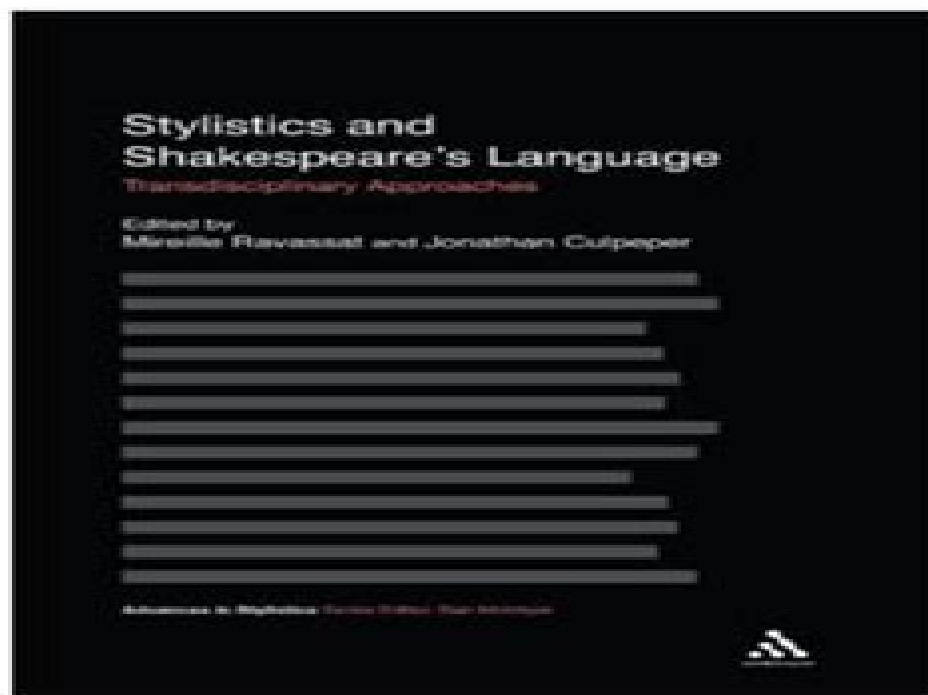


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Vocative Constructions in the Language of Shakespeare Beatrix Busse, 2006-11-08 This study investigates the functions meanings and varieties of forms of address in Shakespeare's dramatic work New categories of Shakespearean vocatives are developed and the grammar of vocatives is investigated in above and below the clause following morpho syntactic semantic lexicographical pragmatic social and contextual criteria Going beyond the conventional paradigm of power and solidarity and with recourse to Shakespearean drama as both text and performance the study sees vocatives as foregrounded experiential interpersonal and textual markers Shakespeare's vocatives construe both quantitatively and qualitatively habitus and identity They illustrate relationships or messages They reflect Early Modern Shakespearean and intra or inter textual contexts Theoretically and methodologically the study is interdisciplinary It draws on approaches from historical pragmatics stylistics Hallidayean grammar corpus linguistics cognitive linguistics socio historical linguistics sociology and theatre semiotics This study contributes thus not only to Shakespeare studies but also to literary linguistics and literary criticism
