Web Style Guides ,1996 This paper describes a study in which Web style guides were characterized compared to traditional human computer interface HCI style guides and evaluated against findings from HCI reviews of web pages and applications Findings showed little consistency among the 21 Web style guides assessed with 75% of recommendations appearing in only one style guide While there was some overlap only 20% of Web relevant recommendations from traditional style guides were found in Web style guides Web style guides emphasized common look and feel information display and navigation issues with little mention of many issues prominent in traditional style guides
